### How to help?

Failure to call these crimes out marginalises the atrocities and provides precedent for them to happen again.

We have provided you with the wording to urge our government to prioritise diplomacy, humanitarian aid, and adherence to international laws that safeguard human dignity. By taking a morally defensible role, Britain can set an example for others and contribute to a more just and peaceful world.

#### HOW TO PREP & SEND YOUR LETTER

- 1 Copy and paste (or handwrite) the wording from the template below into an email or word document (to email or send by mail).
- 2 Use this Look up to find your MP's details to add to the letter header

- 3 Edit the <see blue> military information if that is relevant. Use this optional wording to include any military connection either yours or a family member.
- 4 Delete the <see blue> military information section if that is not relevant to you.
